Income tax basics

- When you earn income, the government (state and federal) is generally owed tax on that income
 - W-2 pay (e.g. through Payroll): Federal and State income tax is withheld (prepaid)
 - 1099 or other pay (e.g. through Bursar or other source): no tax is withheld
 - (non-resident only)1042-S scholarship/fellowship income
- At the end of the year, you "file your income tax return" to report your income to the government and other financial information that may affect how much money you owe.
- If Taxes withheld > Taxes owed → Tax Refund (you get \$)
- If Taxes withheld < Taxes owed → Tax Bill (you pay \$)



Tax deductions vs credits

- Most deductions and credits are available to US citizens and residents only!
- Deductions reduce your taxable income (i.e. the amount of money you pay tax on).
- Credits result in a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the taxes you pay.

 Common tax prep software will help you determine which, if any, deductions and credits you may qualify for.



Progressive income tax: Tax Brackets

Tax Considerations for International Students

- 1. Are you a Resident or Nonresident for Tax Purposes?
 - If you have been in the US for less than 5 years as an F-1/J-1 student, you are likely a Non-Resident
- 2. Use GLACIER to determine Tax Status and Treaty Benefits
- 3. Were you employed in the US at all during 2022? Or received scholarship for room & board? Prize money?
 - If NO, go to isss.oie.gatech.edu/nrtaxes
 - Complete form 8843




International Students with Income

- 1. Obtain all W-2s and/or 1099s from all employers. (Not all students will have both of these forms! Most will not have 1099)
- 2. Use GLACIER to obtain 1042-S. (Necessary for both Residents and Nonresidents with treaties, Bursar refunds, prizes/awards that don't go toward tuition, etc.)
 - 1042-S will be released on or after February 10, 2023
 - Transfer student may need 1042-S from former school
- 3. Request Sprintax Access Code via iStart....almost all other tax prep programs will give nonresidents incorrect results!!!



Sprintax

- Available to Nonresidents only
- Free FEDERAL Tax form preparation
 - State forms are \$44.95 per state
- Request login code through iStart
 - Available on or before February 10, 2023
- E-filing now available for nonresident federal returns.

U.S. Taxpayers and Resident Alien Taxpayers

- One and the same
 - Worldwide income taxed
 - Lots of deductions and credits
 - Spouse and dependents
 - Lifetime Learning Credit, American Opportunity Credit, Earned Income Credit
 - Publication 970 "Tax Benefits for Education"
 - No filing requirements if income < \$12,950 (\$25,900) single (married, joint)
- Tax treaty benefits for:
 - Bangladesh, Belgium, Bulgaria, China, India, Malta, Netherlands, Pakistan and many others:

- 1098-T (useful only for US citizens and resident aliens for tax purposes)
- 1095-C (health insurance)
- 1042-S (international students only)

- Trust the software
 - Beware of street corner tax offices—be an intelligent consumer

 - Fellowship income could be taxed, but there are deductions to offset




1098-T e-form

- Income ≤ \$73,000 (US citizens/resident aliens only)
 - https://www.irs.gov/filing/free-file-do-your-federal-taxes-for-free
 - Check for federal + state and other restrictions
- <u>E-file</u> (US citizens/resident aliens only)
 - Want your refund this year or next?
- Extensions
 - 2022 Deadline: 18 April 2023
 - More time, but can't delay payment
